
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FROM OUR PASTOR

The following is the sermon offered by Fr. Vasken on May 18.

"But, for those of us who believe, the Holy Cross is the power of God."

1 Cor 1:18



is different for everyone. It's about a gift that keeps on giving. And it's about a gift that we can put down but will never put us down.

Today is the Feast Day of the Apparition of the Holy Cross. The Apparition of the Holy Cross is the third of four feasts dedicated to the Cross of Jesus Christ. This Feast is in remembrance of a miracle that

occurred over 300 years after Jesus Christ rose from the dead. Back in the early years of Christianity, the sign of the Holy Cross appeared over the City of Jerusalem.

According to church historians, in the year 351 AD, the sign of the cross appeared in the sky over Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives to the place of Jesus' Resurrection and it is recorded in this way: "The Appearance was so luminous that it shined in the sky brighter than sunlight. It was seen by both the clergy and the laity and everyone rushed to the churches to praise God for this miraculous sign," a sign that their faith did indeed come from God Himself.

Four years ago, twenty-five members of our parish traveled to historic Armenia in present day Turkey. We saw and experienced many unforgettable sites and ruins of a once vast and vibrant Christian Armenia while we drove and walked through the land of our ancestors.

I remember that trip very well and think about it often. I remember walking into many former monasteries that summer—monasteries of which only a crumbling wall or an archway remained to tell of its existence. Each of the monasteries held a story. Each of those monasteries no longer had domes to hold up their crosses. There were no crosses on the altars because the altars were removed long ago. The doors no longer displayed the image of a cross because the doors were long since battered down. But I remembered something very important while visiting those desecrated holy places. It was a phrase I often heard as a child - we are a "cross-bearing people;" we are a "cross-bearing nation."

We were the "crosses" of that monastery on that day witnessing our Christian Faith and Armenian heritage for all the local Kurdish villagers to observe. We were the

"crosses" of our faith proclaiming to the people of each village we entered the Blessed Name of Jesus Christ. The local women stared at us curiously. The children sneered and giggled as they dropped harmless pebbles on us and the men stood off in the distance watching with suspicion wondering who we were and why we travelled into "their" village. Did they know "their village" was once the spiritual home of 800 Armenian monks? I can tell you that they did by the time we left.

We were the "crosses" of our faith proclaiming to the people of each village we entered the Blessed Name of Jesus Christ.

Here is what I came away with on many of those visits to our ancient and forgotten monasteries:

• If we are a "Cross-bearing people," then we have a responsibility to own that title - and wear it well.

- If we are a "Cross-bearing people," then we have to first live the Cross everyday through our lives; then we must take the Cross of Christ into the world in which we live.
- If we are a "Cross-bearing people," then we must hold the Cross of Christ in our hands and go out into the world to continue the work of God:

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- to visit the lonely;
- to befriend those who have no friends and care for the forgotten;
- to love those who rather be negative and miserable and critical;
- and to love those people who essentially don't know what love feels like.
- If we are "Cross-bearing people," then we need to shed the Light of God where darkness is only getting darker; we need to speak faith and hope into the hearts of those who only see doom; and we need to speak encouragement into the lives of those who despair not once or twice but make that a part of what we do in life make it a part of who we are in life.
- If we are "Cross-bearing people," then we must own the title and we must live our lives with the realization that Jesus Christ laid His life down on a Cross for us and had the power to raise it up again, and He did that for each of us and promised to resurrect those who believe in His Name and who carry the Christian Cross into the world.

This is the meaning of today's Feast of the Apparition of the Holy Cross. So, let's take advantage of this Feast Day and ask ourselves:

- "How do I view the Christian Cross in my life?"
- "What does it mean to me?"
- "Where do I need the Cross to lead me today?"

We each had a cross placed on our foreheads when our parents and Godparents walked us into church for our baptisms. That cross was placed there never to be removed. It was placed there to guide our every step. May it guide each one of us as we take our place among the "Cross-bearing people" of the world.

"Where do I need the Cross of Christ to lead me today?" A question we should ask ourselves often.

112TH DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY

he 112th Diocesan Assembly was hosted by the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern) and held at the Diocesan complex in New York, from May 1 to May 3. Attending as delegates from Holy Trinity were Fr. Vasken Kouzouian, Aram Hintlian, James M. Kalustian, Gregory Krikorian, Bruce Newell, and Dean Soultanian. Gregory A. Kolligian, Jr., attended as Parish Council Chairman. There were 157 delegates in attendance representing all of the parishes throughout the Diocese. Once again this year, the theme was Living the Gospel of Christ.

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At the first and second sessions on Thursday, we heard a message from His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians. There were reports on the Clergy Conference, the Sacred Music Council, the Women's Guild Central Council (WGCC), on Development, and the Legate's Committee. There were also Diocesan department reports from Armenian Studies, Christian Education, Youth and Young Adult Ministries, Communications, Zohrab Information Center, and the Mission Parishes. Additional reports were heard from ACEF, FAR, the Ararat Center and St. Nersess Armenian Seminary. Also, elections were held for the assembly Tivan and for Primate, Auditing Committee, Proposals Committee, Nominating Committee, and Board of Trustees.

The third session on Friday morning began with worship. The Primate then addressed the Assembly and gave his annual "Primate's Message." In his address, the Primate announced that we would continue the theme of last year's Assembly, Living the Gospel of Christ. The goal of this theme is to help Armenians understand who Christ is through the traditions of the Armenian Church. The Primate stated: "Last year we explored Living the Gospel as individuals. Now, I would like us to look into this concept from the larger perspective of our parishes and our community as a whole." The Primate also used this opportunity to give his thoughts on the future of our Diocese and the vision he has.

The Primate's message led into a presentation of the Diocesan Council and their Staff Strategic Plan for Living the Gospel of Christ, which was led by Jim Kalustian.

The balance of the morning session was spent in roundtable discussions on the Diocesan Strategic Plan and voting for the offices of Primate and Board of Trustees.

The result on the 5th ballot was that our Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, was elected for a 7th term.

In the fourth session on Friday afternoon, we spent the entire time voting for the office of Primate. There were 4 roll call votes taken,

in addition to the roll call vote taken during the morning session. The result on the 5th ballot was that our Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, was elected for a 7th term. It should be noted that due to the length of the voting, there were 4 Diocesan department group presentations that were cancelled.

The fifth session on Saturday morning began with worship. We heard a report from the Auditing Committee. Diocesan Council Treasurer, Howard Atesian, presented the 2013 financial report and made proposals for the 2014 and 2015 budgets. There was also a report from the Proposals Committee, a report from the 100th Anniversary of the Armenian Genocide Committee, announcement of the 113th Diocesan Assembly in Washington, D.C., and a report from the Courtesies Committee. There was also a discussion of new business.

As I have done each year, I would like to highlight the topics I feel are important. St. Nersess' new 5.5 acre property, located in Armonk, New York, is under construction and the Seminary will be moving in the upcoming months. St. Nersess is still working on selling the current location in New Rochelle. There are currently 9

seminarians and there are 3 new students expected next year.

For the fourth consecutive year, there were lengthy discussions at the Assembly concerning two proposed new bylaws for the Diocese. The first proposal has to do with Looma, a yearly donation that the Diocese makes to Etchmiadzin. The second has to do with the process for selecting our Diocesan Primate. The discussion was lengthy, with over 40 delegates expressing their views. Last year, a proposal passed to give 5% of Diocesan dues to Etchmiadzin. A second proposal to have candidates for Primate pre-approved by the Catholicos vs. in consultation with the Catholicos also passed. This year, both proposals were presented and needed to be passed at this year's Assembly to change the bylaws. The first proposal passed, and after confirmation by the Catholicos, will amend our bylaws. The second proposal failed to pass by a vote of 57 for and 93 against.

The Armenian Church Endowment Fund (ACEF) has \$94,800,000.00 in assets, up from \$87,000,000 in 2012, with 1800 endowed funds. ACEF had a gain in 2013, of 10.4%. ACEF distributed 4.5% to beneficiaries in 2013.

The Ararat Center celebrated its 10th year anniversary in 2013. The Center hired Paul Ventura as the new executive chef and Client Relations Manager. Many facility improvements were made during 2013. Much of the work has been done by volunteers. The pool was refurbished in 2013, and is a great addition to the Center. The Center had a cruise in December to celebrate its 10th anniversary. Another cruise is planned for October 25, in Boston harbor. In 2013, the Center had a \$20,000 positive cash flow from operations.

The Fund for Armenian Relief (FAR) continues to be the major agency delivering aid to Armenia from the Diaspora. There were 2 new initiatives during 2013. In November, FAR launched AYO, a crowd funding platform aimed at raising funds for projects exclusively proposed by

Armenians for Armenians. In March, FAR launched a new program, Breaking the Cycle of Poverty: Developing Thriving Communities. FAR continues to focus on five areas. The first is economic activity and social development which includes Information Technology the Gyumri Center and the Toufayan Agribusiness Development Support Center. The second is Child Protection which includes the FAR Children's Center, the CASP program, and the Gavar Special School. The third is social services which includes soup kitchens and the Vanadzor Old Age Home. The fourth is education which includes the Octet Music School and the Armenian National Science and Education Fund. The fifth is healthcare programs which includes the Continuing Medical Education Program and National Medical Library. In 2013, FAR raised \$8,878,644 in contributions for their programs and spent \$3,299,802 on programs. FAR has over \$15,000,000 in assets.

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The Diocesan financial situation was stable in 2013. In 2013, the Diocese had a surplus of \$120,000 vs. a deficit of \$178,000 in 2012. These numbers are not comparable to prior years. A decision has been made to take the Cathedral operations out of the Diocesan budget. In 2013, the Archbishop's Annual Appeal received \$723,577, down from \$726,577 in 2012. The 2014 budget was revised downward to show a surplus of \$128,440. A budget of \$4,322,000, which includes a surplus of \$116,500, was approved for 2015. A concern is that the Diocese continues to be in debt, uses a line of credit with Citi Bank for \$1,000,000, and that we continue to borrow from restricted funds. The current debt level is \$1,452,349. A plan was presented by Paul Mardoian to eliminate the debt over a 4-5 year period. The plan will focus on 5 areas. They are the Cathedral deficits, increase parish assessments by increasing dues paying members, increase rental revenue at the Diocesan Hall, building ACEF assets, and increasing the Archbishop's Annual Appeal. There are plans for a major renovation of Kavookjian Auditorium to increase rental

income. There are also plans to close the bookstore and convert it to an online store. There will also be an emphasis to get St. Vartan Camp to operate at breakeven. It currently operates at a deficit. The Diocese has a new Director of Development, Lou Ann Matossian.

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of tal The Legate's Committee is working to raise awareness of the Armenian Church among ecumenical and interfaith groups and works with the government regarding Armenian issues. The major concern is the state of Christians in the Middle East, especially in Syria.

There was a lengthy presentation regarding the 2014 Diocesan Strategic Plan after which we had roundtable discussions to make comments on the plan. Based on the theme of Living the Gospel of Christ, the primary objective is to deepen the faith experience of the Armenian Church community. This will be accomplished in 6 areas which are as follows:

- Enhancing the worship experience in our churches
- Enhancing our clergy
- Providing effective youth and young adult ministries
- Promoting Christian and Armenian education for all ages
- Providing outreach to all Armenians and their families
- Promoting the biblical concept of stewardship among the parishes

There will be 2 areas of focus in 2014: enhancing the worship experience in our

parishes and promoting Christian and Armenian education programs.

A proposal to change the bylaws passed regarding the number of candidates a Nominating Committee needs to present for election on the parish level. Instead of a double slate, a slate of 50% more than need to be elected can be presented. It will need to pass again next year to change our bylaws. Under new business, it was agreed that each parish would allocate \$250.00 each year for the ACYOA Central Council.

The 100th Anniversary of the Genocide will be commemorated in Washington, D.C., on May 7 – May 10 next year. There are many events scheduled including a public rally on Capitol Hill, an ecumenical prayer service at the Washington National Cathedral, a memorial concert, and a dinner. Armenians from all over the country are expected to attend. This will be a weekend that you will want to attend.

At the Diocesan Assembly Banquet on Friday evening, Dr. Raffy Hovanessian was honored as the Armenian Church Member of the Year and Ian Gillan, former member of the band Deep Purple, was honored as Friend of the Armenians.

In conclusion, this year's Assembly was a successful one. This is the 23nd year I have been a delegate, and once again, I thank you for allowing me to represent our parish. If you would like any further details on any of the proceedings you may contact me directly.

THE FOLLOWING IS A STORY THAT TRANSCENDS TIME AND TRANSCENDS GENERATIONS.

AS TOLD BY FR. VASKEN AT OUR ACYOA PALM SUNDAY BANQUET ON APRIL 13, IN ACKNOWLEDGING THE GENEROUS \$400,000.00 GIFT TO HOLY TRINITY CHURCH BY ZEVART HOLLISIAN

One day, the church office received a phone call from our devoted and long-time parishioner, Zevart Hollisian, who wanted to come visit for just a few minutes. When she arrived, accompanied by her nephew, Ara Hollisian, Zevart had a smile on her face that revealed more than just "a happy person."

We sat down and, after a few moments, she slid an envelope across the table to me. Upon opening the envelope, I remember glancing at it, thanking her, and continuing our visit. And then, Ara said something that caught my attention. "Der Hayr," he said, "this is going to help a lot around here. It's going to change how we do things around here."

Now when he said that, I felt that I needed to look at the check one more time because the first time I looked at it, I saw the amount of \$400.00, and I thought to myself, "Wasn't that very nice that Zevart is donating \$400.00 to her church, but how will that change the way we do things around here?" At best, it will help, but with a complex this large, \$400.00 is \$400.00. So, I looked at the check one more time. This time more carefully. And, if I remember correctly, my jaw dropped. "Now that's the expression I was hoping for," said Zevart.

The gift she brought to the church office that day was not \$400.00, but \$400,000.00. And, as Ara said, "It has helped a lot around here."

"I came to fulfill a wish from my mother, Haiganoosh," said Zevart. Haiganoosh Hagopian Hollisian lived in Cambridge on Mass Avenue near MIT and the old NECCO Candy Factory. Before passing away, she sat her daughter, Zevart, down, articulated her wishes, and made her promise to fulfill them.

"I came to fulfill a wish from my mother, Haiganoosh," said Zevart.

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True to so many of her generation, Haiganoosh came to America with very little. She arrived in the United States from the Village of Kutbeleh. She arrived very young and was single. She found work at a shoe factory in the Roxbury area, earning \$7 per week. Haiganoosh was introduced to a young man named Garabed Baghdasar Hollisian originally from Kharpert. They married and eventually bought a house together. They raised their family of four children in that home. The years passed and life went on.

Zevart is the last member of the family she was born into. When she came to deliver her check that day in the office, she was fulfilling her mother's wish. Haiganoosh's wish was to thank God and her church for helping her arrive to America, and establish a new beginning. She wanted to thank God for the success of her children; that they each had their own home and that each was better off than when she first arrived to America. Haiganoosh's way of expressing her gratitude was to donate the original house on Mass Avenue in Cambridge - the house that she and Garabed raised their children in - to her parish - to our parish.

It's a beautiful story that says so much. It's a witness to her faith. It's a witness to what those early immigrant Armenians went through to make it here in this new land, and it reminds us from where we all came. So from her eternal life, Haiganoosh is still connected to our parish. May she feel blessed today.

Thank you, Zevart, for fulfilling your mother's wishes. May she be at peace in her eternal rest.



Fr. Vasken announced that in gratitude to Zevart and her parents in a way that will never be forgotten and that will stand as a lasting testimony to their thoughtfulness, the front plaza of our church will be named the "Garabed Baghdasar and Haiganoosh Hagopian Hollisian Plaza," and will be formally dedicated in the fall of this year.

HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY SCHOOL GRADUATES FOUR ON APRIL 6

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Newly Established Diocesan Grace Emily Torosian Sunday School Perfect Attendance Award Presented to Two Graduates

"With this candle, we pass on to you . . . of our faith." Sunday, April 6, 2014, was a day of joyous celebration and tremendous pride in the life of our parish. On this day, four Grade 12 students, having successfully completed the required course of Christian Education as set forth by the Department of Youth and Education at the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern), graduated from the Sunday School in an impressive ceremony in church at the conclusion

of the Divine Liturgy. This year's graduates were Gregory Dorian, son of David and Liza Dorian of Watertown; Alexander (ACE) Colvin Ensign, son of Mark and Jennifer Davagian Ensign of Sudbury; Ani Soultanian, daughter of Dean Soultanian and Arlene Kasarjian of Westwood; and Haig Zakary Torosian, son of Kaspar Torosian of Belmont and the late Grace Emily Torosian. Serving as ushers and participating in the Graduation Ceremony were Grade 11 students Andrew and Mark Gregory, Michelle Sahagian, Olivia Thayer and Emily Zeytoonjian.

The Graduation Ceremony, which was presided over by our pastor, Fr. Vasken A. Kouzouian, began with opening remarks by Seta A. Buchter, Sunday School Superintendent. Seta stated, "We have watched our graduates, over the years, grow and develop into the wonderful young adults they are today. For each of them, their years attending Sunday School has been a journey in discovering who they are as Armenian Christians. During this journey, it has been extremely gratifying to witness our graduates' strengthening of their faith, their greater appreciation and understanding of their religion, culture and heritage, and their growing dedication and commitment to the Armenian Church, especially Holy Trinity Armenian Church." Seta noted that our graduates have been an integral part of the fabric of Holy Trinity's parish life. All of them were ordained acolytes in April 2007 by His Eminence Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Primate, Diocese of the Armenian Church (Eastern), and three continue to serve on the Altar. They have assisted at Trinity Kids' Place, attended St. Vartan Camp, and are actively involved in the ACYOA Juniors where they have served in leadership positions. Seta also congratulated the graduates' parents and families thanking them for their commitment, encouragement and support throughout the years especially as they taught their children by example which is the best teacher of all.

The "Bagdasar and Elmas Garabedian Award," which recognizes two graduating students of the Holy Trinity Sunday School who have maintained an exemplary record throughout their years as a student of the Sunday School, was awarded to Gregory Dorian and Haig Torosian.

The Order of Graduates was then presented to Der Vasken. Each graduate received his/her Sunday School diploma from Der Vasken and a gift of the book, "Armenia: A Journey through History," by Arra Avakian. Each graduate then shared with the congregation "What Sunday School and/or Church Means to Me." For Greg, "The Sunday School and ACYOA have done so much for me throughout the years and have brought me closer to my Christian faith." Church has taught ACE "a lot about not only life, but about who I am as a person and who I aspire to be. . . . I am hugely grateful for my church family . . . I feel that church has laid the cornerstone for my direction in life." For Ani, who served as a Kindergarten Assistant Teacher for her 12th grade service project this year, "it has been a truly rewarding experience." Haig felt that "if my parents never pushed me to keep coming to church at a young age, especially with my mother having been my Pre-School teacher, I can't know if I would be here today."

ACE then presented this year's class gift to Der Vasken which was 8 copies of the Holy Bible, Armenian Church edition, for the pews in the church sanctuary. Greg offered the Bible reading of the day from the Book of Proverbs, chapter 1, verses 1-5 "... to receive the instruction of wisdom, justice, judgment, and equity . . . ," while Haig read the Gospel reading from John, chapter 20, verses 19-23.



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
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
Two very special attendance awards were then presented and those present bore witness to history being made within our Diocese. Der Vasken spoke about



Grace Emily Torosian who was an active member of the Holy Trinity Church and who passed away in August 2013, at the age of 50, after a lengthy illness. Grace was a woman of deep-abiding faith, hope and love and, along with her husband, Kaspar, raised their three sons - Gregory, Mark and Haig - in the faith they trusted in. They devoted themselves to their sons' Christian upbringing, instilling in them an understanding to "do the best you can, because your faith and love are the only things you take with you into heaven." When Haig started Sunday School at the age

of 3, Grace began assisting in the Pre-School class of the Sunday School and did so for many years until illness made it difficult for her to continue. Der Vasken then announced that the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern) has established an Award in Grace's memory - the "Grace Emily Torosian Sunday School Perfect Attendance Award" – and presented the first Award to Grace's son, Haig, for graduating with fifteen years of consecutive perfect attendance. Haig follows his two older brothers who graduated with the same distinction, Gregory in May 2008, with twelve years of consecutive perfect attendance, and Mark, in May 2010, with fourteen years of consecutive perfect attendance. Haig is the fourth Sunday School student to achieve this distinction within the Holy Trinity parish and the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern); the first was Heather Surabian in May 2002 who graduated with twelve years of consecutive perfect attendance.

On this day, Gregory Dorian became the second recipient of the "Grace Emily Torosian Sunday School Perfect Attendance Award" having graduated with consecutive perfect attendance for the past ten years.





The Ceremony concluded with the Graduating Class, in a symbolic gesture, passing a lit candle to the students of Grade 11 with the words, "With this candle, the 2014 Sunday School Graduating Class of Holy Trinity Armenian Church, passes on to you this symbol of our faith with our Hope and Love." The candle, which also represents the passing of leadership from the outgoing Graduating class to the incoming one, was passed from Ani Soultanian to Olivia Thayer.

In offering the closing remarks, Der Vasken congratulated the graduates for their commitment to learning about their faith since they were young children. As Graduation was held on the last Sunday of Great Lent, called the Sunday of Advent, Der Vasken explained that "it's a day that our Church Fathers have set aside for us to consider how prepared we feel – if Christ returned today. It's a day to focus on our preparation." Der Vasken drew an analogy to the Sunday School years as years of preparation. "They are years of building a foundation that can carry these four young people into the next phase of their lives where they will enter college, develop deeper friendships, meet people who believe in things very different than they do . . ." Der Vasken concluded by thanking "our graduates' parents and all the teachers who had a hand in helping these young adults reach this milestone in their lives."



Following church services, the graduates, their families and invited guests were honored at a luncheon held in Johnson Hall.

EASTER WORSHIP SERVICE AND BREAKFAST HELD SATURDAY, APRIL 19



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



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

BOSTON CELTICS' LEGEND JOJO WHITE OFFERS INSPIRING CHRISTIAN WITNESS

"Everything I am I got from God. Everything I know I learned from someone else. That's why I pass it on. We all have to pass it on."

On Sunday, April 27, through the sponsorship of the ACYOA Seniors and Parish Council of Holy Trinity Armenian Church of Greater Boston, parishioners of all ages enjoyed an intimate luncheon with retired Boston Celtics' two-time NBA champion, JoJo White. With his engaging, honest and gentle nature, White captured the hearts of those in attendance, sharing stories from his days as a professional ball player, chronicled in his biography, Make It Count: The Life and Times of Basketball Great JoJo White. Also in attendance was author of Make It Count, Mark C. Bodanza, who together with White, shared poignant, inspiring and captivating stories about White's childhood, family life, and especially, his exciting NBA days during a time of great racial tension in America.





That afternoon, fans of all ages witnessed White's steadfast Christian faith and marveled at his unwavering example of living out his faith in the secular world of professional sports.

White's message was especially inspiring to the many youth and young adults in attendance,



reminding them that their greatness comes from God, that there is no "I" in TEAM, and that life is about "passing it on." Whether you had watched White play at The Garden back in the 70s, or had just met him for the first time, all those present walked away as lifelong fans of JoJo White, a man of great Christian faith, whose impact will not soon be forgotten in the Holy Trinity community.

JoJo White was an All-Star for seven straight years from 1971 through 1977, finishing in the top ten in the league in assists from 1973-77. White continues to be involved in basketball and is currently the Boston Celtics Director of Special Projects and Community Relations.
