Readings of the Day:

Is. 61:10- 62:9. 2 Tm. 2:15-26. Jn. 6:15-21. Today's Bible reading is from the Gospel of Jesus Christ according to St. John, chapter 6, vs. 15-21 and will be read by Robert Dulgarian.

From Today's Bible Reading

John 6:15-21 In this account of Jesus' miracle of walking on the water, he assures his terrified disciples: "It is I; don't be afraid."(v.20). The original Greek is a more powerful construction, namely, "I AM," echoing God's very same self-identification to Moses at the burning bush. *Reflection: Where in your life do you need to remember that Jesus is with you and there is nothing to fear?*

2 Tim 2:15-26 Timothy describes the life of righteousness and love for all ministers in God's service. To counter false teachings, he suggests instructing people gently so that their hearts might open to God's truth. *Reflection: What excellent advice for today's divisive political environment! Have you ever been involved in a "stupid argument" that led to even more quarreling (23-24)? How does St. Paul suggest we handle this? (v.24)*

Is 61:10-62:9 Isaiah describes God's redemptive promises to the Israelites who have returned from a long and painful exile. Now they will be acknowledged by all as a blessed, priestly people of God, clothed in "garments of salvation" and "robes of righteousness."(v.10). These images are echoed in the Armenian rites of baptism and ordination as well as in the priest's vesting prayers before the Divine Liturgy. *Reflection: In 62:10, God tells Israel that "as a bridegroom rejoices over his bride, so will God rejoice over you." The marriage metaphor is often used to describe God's love for us. What are the unique qualities (i.e. fidelity) of marital love that make this so powerful and reassuring?*

Saturday, January 30: St. Sarkis the Warrior (4th century)

Sarkis was a valiant and faithful soldier in Emperor Constantine's army. When Julian became emperor and attempted to reinstate pagan practices, Sarkis took refuge with his son Mardiros (depicted seated with his father) under the protection of King Tiran of Armenia. From there, he went to serve in the Persian army, where he and his son won many converts to Christianity. Both were martyred when they refused to worship pagan idols. Sarkis believed that telling people about Jesus was more important than his life in this world. He died witnessing to Jesus. Fourteen Persian soldiers whom he had converted to Christianity risked their lives to bury the general's body and they too were executed. In the fifth century, Mesrob Mashdots moved the saint's remains to Armenia. Reflection: Pagan idols exist even today (identify them!). In the spirit of St. Sarkis, do you refuse to worship them? In that same spirit, do you share your faith with others?

Holy Trinity Divine Liturgy Reservation Form

Governor Baker has announced an additional change beginning December 26, 2020. This change further reduces capacity for indoor worship. Holy Trinity Church will be adhering to an RSVP system in order for faithful to attend Church services safely.

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. on December 26, 2020, Massachusetts will implement temporary capacity limits to stop the spread of COVID-19 as cases and hospitalizations rise. These limits are in effect until January 10, 2021 unless further extended by the Governor.

The Governor's revised social distancing guidelines, calling for a maximum 25% capacity in houses of worship, more significantly reduces the seating capacity in our sanctuary.

In order to comply and to ensure that we are able to maintain a safe number of attendees, attendance will be by reservation only.



General Guidelines

Arrival at Church

During Divine Liturgy

Livestreams will continue every Sunday beginning at 10:00 AM. We encourage parishioners to utilize this option, especially during the summer when wearing a mask in Church may be uncomfortable.

Please do not congregate before or after Church services. Upon arrival, please proceed to be seated and on departure please proceed directly to your car. Bathroom facilities and the Sanctuary will be sanitized on a regular basis following mandated guidelines and regulations.

We ask for your patience and cooperation during this time, especially as we adapt to new procedures and guidelines.

Please wear a facemask at all times upon arrival and throughout the service.

Please use hand sanitizer prior to entering the Sanctuary.

Seating in the Sanctuary will be limited in order to adhere to social distancing directives from local, state and diocesan sources. Please be flexible as you are ushered to your seat; you may not be able sit in your usual pew.

Please enter only through the main doors. If you are in need of special assistance, the door at Dorian Way will be available for those with special needs.

Please follow Parish Council guidance for seating and wait to be ushered in and seated

You may place your offering in baskets upon arrival or exit. New offering baskets with long poles will be utilized during services.

Pew books and Bibles have been removed from the Sanctuary.

The Kiss of Peace will be conducted by bowing the head toward others, without approaching or touching one another.

Holy Communion will not be administered for the time being, Packets of mahs will be distributed as parishioners enter the Sanctuary. Mahs will be packaged and distributed by gloved hands.

Please follow Parish Council guidance for departure and wait to be ushered out of the Sanctuary after Badarak.
