# **Readings of the Day:**

Is 66:1-24. Col 2:8-3:17. Mt 22:34-23:39. Today's Bible reading is from the Gospel of Jesus Christ according to St. Matthew, chapter 22, vs. 34 -46 and will be read by Sona Tashjian.

### From Today's Bible Reading

Matthew 22:34-23:39 In these verses, Jesus summarizes the law in the two greatest commandments in which all the law and prophecies of the Old Testament can be summarized (22:36-40). In 23, there is an extended warning (the "seven woes") against the vanities and false pieties of the Pharisees. The reading concludes with Jesus' poignant lament for Jerusalem in which (23:37) – in one of the rare moments when a female metaphor for God is used – He yearns to protect its people as a "mother bird gathers her young under her wings." Discuss/reflect: Why do you think Jesus asks us to love God (22:37) "with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind?" What is distinct about each of these three ways of loving?

Colossians 2:8-3:17 In a beautiful accompaniment to today's Gospel, St. Paul urges us to depend on Christ rather than human tradition or worldly principles. Through baptism we have died with Him and are raised with Him into faith and a new way of living. That virtuous, good life is eloquently described in 3:12-17. *Reflection: In Christ "you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator."* (3:9-10) Comparing the "old" ways described in 3:5-8 with the "new" outlined in 3:12-17, how would you rate yourself? Where do you need more of God's help?

**Isaiah 66:1-24** Isaiah conveys God's promise of both restoration and judgment; His children will thrive and be comforted in a new Jerusalem. But those who persist in false worship and rebellion will be harshly judged. Again (as in the Gospel passage above), we are offered a beautiful female image: God will comfort His people as a mother does her child. *Reflection: Isaiah shares these words of God in verse 13: "As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you." God is more often described as a father; what shades of meaning does this picture of God as mother add to your understanding of His love?* 

### **Today is the Sunday of the Advent**

This sixth and last Sunday of Lent is dedicated not only to the Second Coming of Christ but also to His Incarnation, God's becoming Jesus, fully God and fully human. He will come again -- this time not as the gentle and lowly Savior, but as a righteous judge in the glory of His Father with a retinue of angels. He will sift through the good and evil just as a shepherd separates the sheep and the goats at day's end. Jesus declares (Matthew 25:31-46) that we will be judged for acts of righteous goodness born of a loving faith. Did we feed the hungry? Console those in need of comfort, ease suffering? Only on this unequivocal basis, will we be received into eternal life. Reflection: Prayerfully read Matthew 25:31-46. Imagine that day of glory and visualize where you will be; pray for Jesus to open your heart that you might see His face "in the least of these."

# **GREAT LENT**

Great Lent which began on Monday, February 15, and ends on Friday, March 26, is the 40-day period of spiritual preparation that leads to the greatest feast of the Church - Easter. It is a time for focused spiritual disciplines, prayer, reading the Bible, service, giving, fasting and living a simpler life.

# Throughout Lent

- We do not receive or pass the Voghchooyn (Kiss of Peace).
- Holy Communion is not administered. Those in need of Holy Communion may see the Celebrant following the Badarak.
  - Mahs is distributed to the faithful regularly.
- We do not approach the Celebrant at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy to kiss the Gospel.

During this Great Lent, Bishop Daniel is inviting all of the faithful of the Eastern Diocese to join together in prayer during these trying times. As a result, the Diocese has provided a ten-minute daily prayer rule as a way for our faithful to join together in prayer as the Body of Christ.

Great Lent is a time for inner reflection and conversion, an opportunity to reprioritize and reorient ourselves toward God from whom we continually drift and turn our backs.

This year, Great Lent has particular meaning, as the faithful of the Armenian Church have experienced a time of great pain, suffering, injustice, and loss.

Where is our hope? What can we do?

Surely, we can do what our Armenian Christian ancestors have always done during times of trial and hopelessness. Like them, we can confidently turn to God in prayer, not as a last resort, but as a primary and immediate expression of dependence on God.

What you will find below is a communal opportunity for the faithful of the Eastern Diocese to pray together, to unite our concerns as one, to build up the Body of Christ.

All of these prayers are taken from the sacred tradition of the Armenian Church, most of them from the treasury of blessing we call the Zhamakeerk.

We urge all faithful through the duration of Great Lent to find ten minutes each day, preferably at a designated time and location, and read this prayer rule aloud from beginning to end. You can do this alone, with your family, or with a friend. It is also suggested to create a prayerful environment by setting up a Cross, khachkar, icon, candle, and incense.

Keep in mind, this prayer rule is a starting point, a daily prayer rule that should ideally create a habit of prayer, where praise, repentance, and reorienting ourselves toward God becomes a natural and regular part of our lives.

May the Lord hear our prayers and have mercy on us.

By their prayers and intercession, may the loving God grant us whatever is pleasing to him, and always consider and do whatever is helpful for us. And let us share in the indescribable gifts that Jesus Christ, the true God, promised to all those who love him. Lord, raise us to life and have mercy on us.

### He Knows

Amen, I say to you, one of your will betray me. Matthew 26:21

Jesus knows which of these men - one of his closest friends - will betray him. And what does he do? He tells Judas to go ahead. We read in the gospel of Jesus sharing food with his betrayer, giving Judas a morsel of bread. Thomas Merton once wrote: "Our job is to love others without stopping to inquire whether or not they are worthy." In this 5th week of Lent, let's ask ourselves, have we stopped to judge before helping someone? This is hard. Another reason to pray and reflect deeply this week.



# **Holy Etchmiadzin' ARTSAKH OUTREACH Mission**

In a message to Diocesan leaders, Bishop Daniel Findikyan enlisted the support of the Eastern Diocese in a critical new mission of the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin. Called "Artsakh Outreach," the humanitarian effort aims to deliver help to the large number of displaced families from Artsakh, who have been severely affected by the abrupt end to the fighting and Armenia's acquiescence to the terms of the ceasefire. That help includes material relief and housing, but also social services and spiritual outreach to help families deal with the horrors of living through the war. No one who survived the conflict, whether soldier or civilian, is able to sleep peacefully at night in the aftermath. A committee operating under the auspices of His Holiness Karekin II, the Catholicos of All Armenians, is comprised of some 20 individuals from Armenia and major dioceses of the diaspora. Its Finance sub-committee has created guidelines for donations, budgets, and expenditures, to maintain a tight reign on where funds originate, how they are allocated, and how they are eventually spent. The controls allow for swift decision-making, efficient use of funds, and total visibility and accountability. "We can all be proud of the way the people of the Eastern Diocese stood tall in support of Artsakh and Armenia in the dark days of war last year. But Armenia and Artsakh still need our help," says the Primate in his appeal to support Artsakh Outreach.

# General Guidelines

Livestreams will continue every Sunday beginning at 10:00 AM. We encourage parishioners to utilize this option, especially during the summer when wearing a mask in Church may be uncomfortable.

Please do not congregate before or after Church services. Upon arrival, please proceed to be seated and on departure please proceed directly to your car.

Bathroom facilities and the Sanctuary will be sanitized on a regular basis following mandated guidelines and regulations.

We ask for your patience and cooperation during this time, especially as we adapt to new procedures and guidelines.

# Arrival at Church

Please wear a facemask at all times upon arrival and throughout the service.

Please use hand sanitizer prior to entering the Sanctuary.

Seating in the Sanctuary will be limited in order to adhere to social distancing directives from local, state and diocesan sources. Please be flexible as you are ushered to your seat; you may not be able sit in your usual pew.

Please enter only through the main doors. If you are in need of special assistance, the door at *Dorion Way* will be available for those with special needs.

Please follow Parish Council guidance for seating and wait to be ushered in and seated.

# **During Divine Liturgy**

You may place your offering in baskets upon arrival or exit. New offering baskets with long poles will be utilized during services.

Pew books and Bibles have been removed from the Sanctuary.

The Kiss of Peace will be conducted by bowing the head toward others, without approaching or touching one another.

Holy Communion will not be administered for the time being, Packets of mahs will be distributed as parishioners enter the Sanctuary. Mahs will be packaged and distributed by gloved hands.

Please follow Parish Council guidance for departure and wait to be ushered out of the Sanctuary after Badarak.
