From Today's Bible Reading

Luke 17:1-10 Jesus shares four critical teachings with his disciples (and us): 1. Sin will come – watch for those who carry it with them, 2. Be generous with your forgiveness, 3. The smallest seed of faith can empower you beyond your understanding, and 4. Doing all I tell you does not call for self-congratulations, for it is simply what you should be doing. *Reflection: Which of these four life guidelines speaks to you? Can you think of a specific experience?*

Hebrews 1:1-14 The early readers of Hebrews might have venerated angels to such a degree that the epistle writer felt it important to stress Jesus' sovereignty over them. In doing so, he lays out a compelling series of statements about who Jesus is. *Reflection:* With pen in hand, read today's epistle reading. Underline or write out the words or phrases that describe Jesus. Begin a prayer with "Lord Jesus Christ, you who...Add all these descriptions and then your personal petitions.

Isaiah 38:1-8 King Hezekiah, ill and at the point of death, prays for healing. God restores the King's health and pledges protection to Jerusalem. *Reflection: Hezekiah declares to God that he had "done what is good in Your eyes. (v 3)." In St. Nersess' famous "Wisdom" prayer, he asks God for the wisdom to "do what is good in Your sight." What do you do that might be god in His sight?*

Saturday, December 25 is the Feast of St. Stephen (and Christmas!)

Ordained (in an early ritual of laying on of hands) along with six others to serve the poor at the common table, St. Stephen was renowned for his dedication and faith. Acts 6-8:2 relates his story, culminating in a martyr's death by stoning and his burial. He is acknowledged by the Church as the first to die for his faith (protomartyr). The intensity and sincerity of St. Stephen's faith deeply impressed Saul, the infamous persecutor of Christians who witnessed Stephen's martyrdom. Upon his own conversion, he became Paul, zealous apostle to the Gentiles and one of the greatest missionaries of the Church. St. Stephen is the role model for altar servers, particularly deacons. During Badarak on this feast day, it is traditional in some places for all deacons serving at the altar to wear a liturgical crown, which is worn only by priests on all other days of the year, the crown here being a symbol of martyrdom. St. Stephen is often depicted holding a censer and a miniature church, as well as a martyr's palm branch and stones.

Is. 38:1-8. Heb. 1:1-14. Lk. 17:1-10.

Today's Bible reading is from the Gospel of Jesus Christ according to St. Luke, chapter 17, vs. 1-10 and will be read by Ann Danielson.

The Practice of Youghakin

Twice a year parishioners receive special envelopes and are asked to donate "Youghakin," but many know little about the practice. Youghakin is made up of two Armenian words: "yough" and "kin." "Youghakin" literally means the price of oil or donation in lieu of oil.

In early days, prior to electricity, oil lamps and lanterns illuminated homes and worship places. Parishioners donated oil to keep the church lit. After the invention of electricity, as oil lamps were replaced with electrical lamps, the Armenian Apostolic Church continued asking members to bring symbolic contributions for the illumination of the church through the Youghakin program at Christmas and Easter.

The context of this practice is inner illumination rather than stewardship. When you send in your Youghakin envelope, you are not merely helping the church financially, but are helping centuries of Armenian faith shine. Light and faith are synonymous. According to the New Testament, whoever has faith is in light. Jesus says: "I am the light of the world; he who follows Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." [John 8:12]. Through Youghakin, you are in effect refueling the traditional symbolic lantern of faith which St. Gregory the Illuminator lit. According to legend, St. Gregory, after building the convent of St. Garabed in Moush, hung a lantern from the ceiling of the cathedral to encourage Armenians in their faith. He indicated that as long as the lantern was lit, the light of their faith would shine. The lantern stood as a symbol of their faith.

In the cathedral, there was believed to be a demon, tamed by the saint who punished him by forcing him to dust every day. When the saint was sleeping, the demon extinguished the lantern. The saint would awaken and light the lantern again, not knowing why the flame had died. This continued over several days. Finally, a frustrated St. Gregory took the lantern to the tomb of St. Garabed, fasted, prayed and cried for 40 days. At the end of the fasting, he found the lantern filled with his tears. He lit the lantern and hung it in its place and slept in the church. The demon was ready to blow at the wick, when suddenly the heavens rumbled. The saint awoke and caught the demon red-handed. Crippled by the saint's cane, the demon never again dared to approach. From that day on, St. Gregory's lantern has shone in our sanctuaries all over the world. The light is perpetual, the faith everlasting.

After hearing this story, which Armenian Christian will not come forward to refuel our lantern of faith? Youghakin is not about dollars, but about participating in the enlightenment of our faith and our spiritual home.
